# SHERLOCK HOLMES MAP

1. St Bartholomew's Hospital – where Dr Watson and Sherlock Holmes are first introduced by young Stamford. (A Study in Scarlet)
2. 221b Baker Street – where Sherlock Holmes and Dr Watson shared rooms.
3. Briony Lodge, Serpentine Avenue, St John's Wood – where Irene Adler lived, 'the woman' for Sherlock Holmes. (A Scandal in Bohemia)
4. Paddington Station – Holmes and Watson embarked on many journeys from here to solve crimes all over the country and, most famously, Sir Henry Baskerville caught the train from here for the haunted moors of his ancestral home. (The Hound of the Baskervilles)
5. Pall Mall – Holmes' older brother Mycroft lived in rooms here near the Carlton, opposite his club, the Diogenes Club, of which he was a founding member. (The Greek Interpreter)
6. Broad Street – Mordecai Smith's landing stage for his steam launch, Aurora, was here. (The Sign of Four)
7. Downing Street – Holmes and Watson interviewed Lord Holdhurst in the Foreign Office here in connection with the missing naval treat. (The Naval Treaty)
8. New Scotland Yard – Headquarters of the Metropolitan Police - Holmes kept in close contact with the police for all his cases.
9. Victoria Station – Holmes and Watson went on the run from their most deadly enemy, Professor Moriarty, narrowly escaping him on a train from here. (The Final Problem)
10. 427 Park Lane – Honourable Ronald Adair was found dead in his room, his head horribly mutilated by an expanding revolver bullet. (Adventure of the Empty House)
11. Regent Street – Baron Gruner's gang attacked Holmes outside the Café Royal. (The Illustrious Client). Holmes and Watson also took a cab along here in pursuit of the mysterious man with the black bushy beard. (The Hound of the Baskervilles)
12. Goodge Street – Henry Baker was attacked by 'a little knot of roughs', losing his hat and his Christmas goose. (The Blue Carbuncle)
13. St James's Hall – Watson and Holmes, an enthusiastic musician, spent an enjoyable afternoon at a concert here. (The Red-Headed League)
14. Charing Cross Station – Watson stood stunned outside this station when he saw the one-legged news-vender's placard proclaiming 'Murderous Attack upon Sherlock Holmes'. (The Illustrious Client)
15. Montague Street – Holmes lodged here before meeting Watson and moving to Baker Street.
16. Fleet Street – The offices of the Red-Headed League were located here and, following their advertisement, the street 'was choked with red-headed folk'. (The Red-Headed League)
17. 403 Brook Street - Mr Blessington, a gentleman staying with Dr Percy Trevelyan, was found dead in his room, hanging from the ceiling. (The Resident Patient)
18. Northumberland Avenue – Holmes and Watson went to their favourite Turkish bath here. (The Illustrious Client)
19. 131 Pitt Street, Kensington – Mr Horace Harker's house was broken into, a cheap bust of Napoleon stolen, and Mr Harker, pursuing the burglar, stumbled over the body of a man outside his house. (The Adventure of the Six Napoleons)
20. 16 Godolphin St, Westminster – Mr Eduardo Lucas was found stabbed in his house. (The Adventure of the Second Stain)
21. Aldgate tube station - Arthur Cadogan West's dead body was discovered on the track outside this station, just where it emerges from the tunnel. (Adventure of Bruce-Parkington Plans).
22. Waterloo Station - Henry Baskerville was met here and chaperoned to safety by Dr Mortimer. (The Hound of the Baskervilles)
23. Waterloo Bridge – John Openshaw was reported to have 'fallen' into the water from this bridge, at a time when Holmes was investigating the Ku Klux Klan in East London. (The Five Orange Pips)
24. Bond Street - Holmes and Watson dropped into one of the picture galleries here while waiting to hear back from their source about the name of a suspicious cab driver. (The Hound of the Baskervilles),
25. Leadenhall Street Post Office - where Miss Sutherland addressed her letters to her lover Mr Hosmer Angel. (A Case of Identity)
